Furniture Proposal

Cultural Integration: Creating Space for Indigenous Pride

Here at the Abbotsford School District, we have outlined goals for to promote and ensure the success of our Indigenous students. Indigenous students in this generation are amongst the most vulnerable, due to their unique history of oppression and transgenerational trauma that still weighs heavily on communities and families today. To ensure we, as district employees, are giving them the greatest chance at success, we follow the guidelines presented in the Enhancement Agreement. This proposal has been conducted with these goals at the forefront.

The Indigenous students at Fraser Middle School make up more than 10% of the student population. This year alone, we service 70 students through our Indigenous Support Workers. With such a large number of students, we have overgrown the capacity of our designated room. Thankfully, the administration and I have found an alternate space, that is large enough to ensure we are able to work towards our enhancement agreement goals with our students. Below, I have highlighted elements of the Enhancement Agreement that will be engaged with if we are to receive funding.

- Student Success: consistent attendance Consistent attendance is a major issue with Indigenous students for a variety of reasons. Creating a space students want to visit promotes school attendance and provides a safe space for important social behaviour regulation needed by many students attending Fraser.
- Student success: reading achievement benchmarks- this furniture will create a comfortable space for reading circles, where students can engage in literacy training, both privately and in group settings. This may help to avoid any embarrassment for those who struggle in this area and don't feel comfortable practicing in front of their peers.
- Cultural Identity: The funding we are requesting will allow us to design our space with culturally significant drawing and décor that foster personal connections to the variety of Indigenous communities representing amongst our student population including Inuit, Metis and various First Nations communities.
- This space will also promote cultural pride. One issue we have run into at Fraser is cultural insecurity
 amongst our Indigenous students. Many teachers have expressed a lack of cultural pride. Having an
 enjoyable space to share and engage within their own community of peers will aid in promoting cultural
 pride and encourage them to share the space and the teachings with their non-indigenous peers.
- Equity and success: According to our Enhancement Agreement, Indigenous students thrive in an environment that supports equity and access to opportunities in schools. They also have the right to a culturally safe learning environment, including a space where they can feel safe, connected and supported.

We are hoping that we can attain PAC funding to furnish this space, in a way that welcomes and promotes cultural integration and wellbeing. Below I have outlined the items I am wishing to purchase to create this space for our students. I have also given brief explanations for cultural significance and outlined the price points that have been provided by the manufacturer.

This furniture comes in an 8-piece set, with a lifetime warranty and a fabric that is easy to wipe down and keep clean. It will last, and help keep our students safe from the spread of germs, which is especially important in light of the recent COVID-19 pandemic. The manufacturer has agreed to accommodate our request to have the colours as shown above, due to it's significance in Sto:lo culture. These colours represent the medicine wheel, which promotes consideration of all things in regard to their impact on the mind, body, spirit and emotion collaboratively. Having this visual representation in our room will promote integrated learning within our scheduled reading groups and cultural teachings. It also provides a comfortable and friendly space for those students who struggle with reading to practice their literacy skills and engage in comprehensive discussion.

Delivery is included in the price list to the left. We will need the XL Train Station Set in order to accommodate all grades at Fraser Middle School. There will be a price increase by roughly 5% if not ordered by May 1st, 2022 (\$9,089.85).

This carpet displays the medicine wheel as well as the Seven Grandfather Teachings. In the coming year, I am hoping to cover the Seven Teachings school wide. Having this display will help to engage our Indigenous students, so that we can work together to educate the rest of the school on this important part of Sto:lo culture.

The carpet is 7'8" x 10'9" and \$555.70.



I would also like to purchase four 3' heavy duty beanbag chairs and one 6' heavy duty lounger chair. With the high volume of behavioural and social emotional needs at Fraser Middle, it is important to provide a space where kids can calm down when needed and can also be used for building social skills amongst their peers. I would like to use the chairs primarily around the carpet to run small-group social emotional sessions, promoting healthy relationship building, self-esteem, emotional regulation etc . This space can also be used for talking circles, which can help with conflict resolution. During open periods (Nutbreak & Lunch) it can be used for social engagement by our Indigenous students, who may invite their non-indigenous peers in a space where they can feel comfortable engaging and taking pride in their culture.
